PRACTITIONERS NOW RECOMMENDING BEGINNING STUDENTS

Part of the revised Training Track requires that prospective Students receive Trager sessions from a Practitioner and, possibly, take an Introductory Workshop. They need a recommendation from one of the Practitioners with whom they have had professional contact to take the Beginning Training.

The Training Track committee designed this as a gentle screening device, as well as a way to give Students some Trager experience before training. The committee hoped this screening would divert some people from the training who aren't appropriate and would slow down others who aren't ready yet and who need more Trager work done to them before they try and learn it.

When you give Trager sessions to prospective Students, the main things to look for are receptivity, presence, contact, and communication. The vast majority of people will seem easily appropriate for the training. You will need merely to sign their application form or write them a note which they will need to attach to their application form.

There will be some people whose physical tensions and/or attitude make it seem that they would have difficulty learning Trager in their current state. Feel free to suggest that they receive additional sessions before the training. Write down the number of sessions you suggest on their application or a separate piece of paper. Also feel free to communicate your suggestions for that person to the Sponsor and/or Instructor of the training the person wishes to take, so that they can back you up and follow through. An example of this was a woman that came to a Practitioner for a pretraining session who was quite loud and pushy and disclosed that she had already planned to take the Intermediate one month after her Beginning, so she could make money soon. The Practitioner suggested that the woman receive 15 sessions before the training to allow her to experience more of the Trager feeling. The Practitioner called the Instructor and the suggestions were made into a requirement.

The last category is people who seem inappropriate as future Trager professionals. You can refuse to give them a recommendation. You may, if it seems appropriate, gently tell the person that you do not feel they should train in this work. You may also refer the person to the Sponsor and/or Instructor for further contact. You should communicate your concerns to the Sponsor and the Instructor so that they know what to be looking for, and they can ask for a second opinion and/or reject the person. If your concerns are very strong, you should write to the Institute as well.



NEW DUES RENEWAL PROCESS

Thanks to an initiative by Sheila Merle Johnson, we are returning to a much more efficient dues renewal process. Dues will now be based on the calendar year. As renewal notices are sent out for our 2nd, 3rd, and 4th quarter members, the dues will be prorated. 4th quarter members will be sent a renewal notice which will include 1986. This means that if you are a 4th quarter member, you will receive your renewal notice in the Fall '85 newsletter, and you will renew for that one quarter, and the rest of 1986. This will save everyone involved some paperwork. As new members join, they will simply pay dues prorated for the calendar year.

REMINDER OF UPCOMING DEADLINES

MAY 1, 1985: TRAINEES must get Practitioner Candidate papers to Institute.

DECEMBER 31: PRACTITIONER CANDIDATES must get Practitioners papers to Institute.

TRAINEES and PRACTITIONER CANDIDATES who do not meet these deadlines will become Students, and will NOT be able to charge for their work until they complete the new Practitioner requirements.

RAISE 1986 DUES?

I want to offer you some facts and figures to tickle your thoughts about some future possibilities for the Institute. Practitioner dues have stayed constant for the last couple of years. Membership dues (all levels) account for about 42% of the Institute's annual income. Instructor tithes (from less than 1% of the membership) account for 20% of the income. Current income pretty well covers current Institute services rendered. If we keep the levels of service the same in the future, the dues could probably remain fairly constant, except for minimal rises in 1986 and future years to cover rising postage and other costs. That is the vision based on the perpetuation of the status quo.

There are other models, however, for both Practitioner dues and services rendered. Both Feldenkrais and Rolf Practitioners pay far more per year than Trager Practitioners to support their respective institutes. For example, the Rolfers pay over 10 times as much as we do. That figure may seem shocking, but when you examine what services that that allows their institute to provide for them, it gives pause about what we might do. My understanding is that they have good legal support for their practitioners. Part of that support has been to help practitioners get licensed in each state and, where possible, to help the passage of better State laws. They have good marketing services to help practitioners develop their practices. They can afford to have a participatory democracy for running aspects of the institute, since they can bring elected representatives in from the distant regions.

These are just a few of the possible services that a substantial dues raise could make possible, and this seems the appropriate time to think about it since the theme of this year's conference is *Professionalism*. Please take some time to write down what extra services you would like and what raise in dues you would like to see to cover them. Write those ideas to me at the Institute. I will assemble what I receive for presentation at the Conference where we can get greater input. The decision will be made in the fall, based on the input, for 1986 Practitioner dues.
